SUPERVISOR ROHR: Good evening everyone. Welcome to the April 20th virtual Town Board meeting. We'll start with the pledge of allegiance and then we will proceed with the rest of the meeting.

ALL: I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic, for which it stands, one nation, under God, indivisible, with Liberty and justice for all.

I'm working off my phone, so if everyone just would give me a few moments to get a statement up regarding the topic of tonight's meeting. I've confirmed with the Town's Counsel that tonight's meeting has been convened in accordance with the Governor's March 13, 2020 executive order 202-1 which suspends certain provisions of the open meeting law to allow a municipal board to convene a meeting, via video conferencing and in accordance with the executive order the public has been provided with the ability to view tonight's work session meeting and the transcript will be provided at a later date. I have done a roll call of the Board members and there is a quorum present for the meeting. I have also confirmed with the Town Clerk that this meeting has been duly noticed. We'll get started with the agenda very shortly.

Neil, maybe you could actually put it up and that way I won't have to work off my phone.

SUPERVISOR ROHR: So during this period when we are having virtual meetings, of course, public comments can be submitted on any resolution or any matter of town business to our Town Clerk at [dmcgrogan@hydeparkny.us](mailto:dmcgrogan@hydeparkny.us). So, just a few updates before we get started on the resolutions. First I would like to just inform everyone that on our conference call with the County today, our County Executive informed all the municipalities, the cities, towns and villages that we should be aware that there is going to be a significant reduction in sales tax and mortgage tax for 2020 and of course this is going to have significant impact on our budget.

At this point in time they are predicting a 40% reduction in sales tax. So, besides property taxes, income revenue is generated through sales and mortgage tax. We will be looking at our budgets and trying to find places that we can trim different expenses. We're taking it as it comes. The County Executive did mention that a lot of revenue is generated through the grocery stores. Although much of that is tax free, so you know, we're waiting and watching, see-

ing where it's going. We will be looking to cut costs wherever we can to compensate for that reduced revenue. There are a few additional updates regarding the adaptations or adoptions that we've all had to make in response to Covid-19.

We have been all working really hard. In fact, we agreed today that it's actually harder to be doing so many of our meetings via zoom and spending a lot of time keeping everyone in the loop. That's been effective and we appreciate all our department heads and employees that are going above and beyond to continue the work of local government. We do have some expectations that the limitations on mass gatherings will continue through the end of May. That is absolutely going to impact our Memorial Day parade and service. I reached out to Mike Athanas today to let him know that it is likely to be canceled because of the limitation on mass gatherings. I look forward to talking with Mr. Athanas about other ways that we can honor our veterans at Memorial Day. Also, you'll see a resolution on the agenda tonight allowing the town's Recreation Department to participate in a program called Amped for Camp which would essentially be a virtual camp as a substitute, for our summer program.

We don't have confirmation as of yet that our summer camp will be canceled, but there are a lot of indications that it likely will. The Department of Health is not issuing any type of permits for pools, camps, or bungalows or for any other short term summer type programs. So, it is likely that that also will be canceled. But you know, I applaud the Rec director and the Rec leader for seeking alternatives and we'll keep everyone apprised of that as we move ahead. I know that Neil has been really hard at work. In addition to organizing the Town Board zoom meetings, he's been working with the Planning Board and the ZBA to provide those meetings on YouTube as well. That's a great service. The ZBA has not been televised in the past, so now people can really take advantage of this time and see what the ZBA is doing. I know that Neil also has some updates on community outreach as a Hyde Park's response to the Covid-19 crisis has evolved. So, Neil, would you like to get those up?

Councilman Krupnick: We sent out a request to ask people to volunteer and we put a link up on our website, and it's [hydeparkny.us](http://hydeparkny.us) and we go right to the left here and for volunteering. You just fill out the form and you say what you're interested in doing. We received, we gathered about 37 volunteers so far and 14 of which are phone volunteers. And understandably, a lot of people would prefer to just do phone calls. They don't feel secure about shopping for people, doing any kind of face to face visit with somebody. That's very understandable. The people who have been doing the phone calls, we've actually, we have a list of about 4,700 residents who are over 60, and we've called thousands of them so far.

Dave is one of our phone volunteers and I just can't thank them enough. The response has been really fantastic because most people are just grateful that someone is out there and cares. We've gotten a lot of just thank you for checking in and I'm fine, and we remind them to check on their neighbors, et cetera. So, it's been a really good service. We've also actually done shopping for a number of people. We've had some people that homemade some masks. I'm going to forget her name. I'm sorry if you're watching. Some other people have made masks and we've distributed them. The Friends of Hyde Park have actually ordered 500 masks, 335 of them are already accounted for essential businesses around town. The Anderson Center, food pantries, gas stations, deli's, veterinarians and restaurants have all said yes, we'd love them.

I'm very grateful for Friends of Hyde Park. We're also in the process of this, we've asked people instead of the people calling up to give out a phone number instead of their own phone number, just a central hotline is essential. Sorry, not a hotline, an essential community outreach line and we are going live with that line. So now it's not just if you get a phone call, but this phone line, let me put it up on the screen, will be available to call. It's not a hotline. Okay, the

number is (845) 366-9958. You won't get a live person. You'll get a message. It will sound a lot like me. It's not a hotline, so it's not for emergencies.

If you have an actual emergency, please call 911. It's a place where you can leave a message and let us know if you or someone else needs help with food deliveries, prescription pickups, information about food pantries or other programs to get food. And, it's just, I can't stress enough that we have a limited number of volunteers, so we can do the best to meet your needs. We might send you to another source but we're going to try our best. And like I said, I showed you how to sign up for the volunteer list. So, anybody else out there that wants to volunteer, that would really be appreciated.

Supervisor Rohr: That's great. Thank you so much. It's really wonderful work you're doing. And I would strongly encourage residents to go to DutchessNY.gov for additional information. It's a great website. It does update the information on COVID, illnesses, recoveries by municipality every day. There's other links on that website as well, especially to the Dutchess Business Notification Network which has all the information on these assistance programs that are being provided through the state. Just one further update and actually a request on that item. On the conversation, the call today with the County Executive, they let us know that Congress is considering an additional bill, COVID 3.5 that will be providing additional stimulus monies. The prior bills did not include any federal funding for municipalities.

We are asking people, residents to reach out to their Elected Officials, Congressman Delgado, Senator Gillibrand, Senator Schumer, to let them know how important this is to the continuation of services and to controlling the tax impact of the virus. If people have those contact numbers available, that'd be great to reach out. We can put a post up tomorrow on our Facebook page that can provide the contact info, but we really do need to have our presence felt that it's going to not just impact businesses, but really will directly impact residents in terms of loss of services or increases in their property taxes. So, I'll be reaching out to our Elected Officials tomorrow and strongly encouraging everyone else to do the same. Does anyone else have any additional updates? I know that our Rec leader, Teresa Gasperini is working on some additional programs.

We had a very successful breakfast with the Easter Bunny and you know, everyone is really working hard to adapt to the situation with a lot of creativity and nimbleness. Unless there's other updates, I would ask to entertain an amendment to Resolution# 4:20 - 5 of 2020, that would add the words nunc pro tunc to the resolution with the Chamber of Commerce contribution to the maintenance of the sign.

Resolution 4:20-7 of 2020 revises the fee schedule to reflect a change in a reapplication fee for a project that is of a larger magnitude, because at the current time, our fee schedule requires a 75% payment to re-up your building permit fee. And that's certainly fair, for smaller projects and certainly fair for projects that extend beyond, what is a logical timeframe for very large projects like the Bellfield, the Inn at Bellfield, and some of the very substantial projects of one

year is really not enough, especially with the delay in non-essential construction.

So, that is Resolution 4:20 - 7 of 2020, it's amending the fee schedule to reflect that change.

Resolution 4:20 - 8 of 2020 is allowing Bellfield to utilize that amended fee. May I have a motion to add those two items to the agenda?

**WHEREAS**, the Town of Hyde Park, in a letter received by the County Executive dated February 7, 2020, was awarded CDBG funding in the amount of \$100,000 to be used for the Town of Hyde Park Recreation Dinsmore Park Improvement Project; and

**WHEREAS**, the Town will require the services of an engineer for the plans, bid manual, bidding coordination, and construction administration services for said project; and

**WHEREAS**, the Towns consulting engineer, Clark Patterson Lee Architecture, Engineering, and Planning has provided the Town with a proposal for said services dated April 16, 2020 in the amount of \$3,050; and

**WHEREAS**, the Town Supervisor and Town Comptroller agree with said proposal.

**RESOLUTION 4:20 – 7 OF 2020**

**RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE TOWN OF HYDE PARK TOWN BOARD TO AMEND THE 2020 FEE SCHEDULE FOR THE TOWN OF HYDE PARK**

**WHEREAS**, Chapter 40, §40-4(H) of the Town Code provides, in relevant part, that a building permit which has become invalid or which has expired pursuant to that subsection of the Code may be renewed upon application by the permit holder, payment of the applicable fee, and approval of the application by the Building Inspector; and

**WHEREAS**, §40-4(J) provides, in relevant part, that the fee specified in accordance with provisions of §40-16, Fees, of the Code must be paid at the time of the submission of an application for a building permit, an amended building permit, or for a renewal of a building permit; and

**WHEREAS**, §40-16 of the Code provides that Chapter 40, §40-4 and §40-4(A) of the 2020 Fee Schedule provides, in relevant part, at page 2 of the Fee Schedule, as follows:

“Renewal of Active Permit - \$75% of original fee not less than \$100 plus \$50 for each expired year.

and

**WHEREAS**, the Town Board has determined that in cases of the fee for larger projects with substantial building permit fees, the renewal payment requirement of 75% of the original fee may be excessive and may not accurately reflect the administrative and other costs to the Town of the renewal of such a building permit.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Town of Hyde Park Town Board does hereby authorize that the 2020 Fee Schedule, Chapter 40, §40-4(A), "Renewal of Active Permit" section at page 2 of said Fee Schedule shall be amended to provide for two asterisks after that section with a note following at the bottom of that section to read as follows:

\*\*The Town Board shall have the power, upon application of the developer/permit holder, and after seeking the advice and recommendation of the Planning Board and Building Inspector, to reduce the renewal of active permit fee from 75% of the original fee to a fee determined by the Town Board that is fair and equitable and which more accurately represents the administrative, and other, costs to the Town of processing a renewal of a building permit application."

#### **RESOLUTION 4:20 – 8 OF 2020**

#### **RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE REDUCTION OF THE RENEWAL BUILDING PERMIT APPLICATION OF T-REX HYDE PARK IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE INN AT BELLEFIELD PROJECT**

**WHEREAS**, the building permit fee for the Inn at Bellefield was approximately \$65,000; and

**WHEREAS**, the Town Board has, by Resolution 4:20-7 of 2020, authorized the Town Board, upon application of the developer/permit holder to reduce the renewal building permit fee, as required by §40-4(A) of the Fee Schedule from 75% of the original building permit application fee to a fee, which the Town Board determines is fair and equitable and fairly represents the administrative and other costs to the Town of processing the amended building permit application fee; and

**WHEREAS**, T-Rex Hyde Park will be applying for a building permit for Phase 1-A of the approved Concept Plan for the St. Andrews Plant Use Development and it is anticipated that the building fee will be approximately \$65,000; and

**WHEREAS**, T-Rex has determined that it will not be able to complete the project within one year of the issuance of the building permit because of the Covid-19 Pandemic and other reasons and they are anticipating that they will have to make, in the future, an application for a renewed building permit after the expiration of the one year period, and they have applied to the Town Board for a determination that when the renewed building permit is made after the expiration of the one year period, it will not require a renewal fee of 75% of the original amount of the building permit; and

**WHEREAS**, the Town Board has reviewed the application of T-Rex and has determined that, under the circumstances of this project, the imposition of a renewal fee for the building permit in the of 75% of the original fee would be excessive and not reflective of the true administrative cost of the Town in processing said fee; and

**WHEREAS**, the Town Board has sought the advice and input of the Planning Board and the Building Inspector.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Town Board does hereby determine, pursuant to the powers vested in the Town Board by the amendment to the Fee Schedule adopted by the Board by Resolution 4:20-7 of 2020, that the renewal building permit fee for the Bellefield project if applied for be reduced to \$3,000 provided the application for the renewal building permit fee is made no later than twelve (12) months after the issuance of the building permit and the project is substantially completed within two (2) years of the issuance of the original building permit.

So, we are postponing the rescheduled public hearing. We have not scheduled it until we have further information as to when we can hold that in public. So, that's my update. And, with that I would ask for a motion to adjourn.


